Modern Myth

- Entries for the Modern Myth contest must be submitted to the NCJCL Secretary's Sponsor by the
 postmark deadline announced in the fall e-mail and on the website where addresses are also listed.
 Entries submitted after the deadline will not be judged.
- Students competing at the state level do not need to attend the convention in order to win an award for the Modern Myth contest, but chapter registration for state convention is required.
- 3. There will be three divisions for each category; lower (6-8), middle (9-10), and upper (11-12).
- 4. A student may enter only one myth.
- 5. Each chapter is limited to a total of twelve (12) modern myth submissions.
- 6. The names of the all winners will be printed in the spring issue of the Torch: NC available at the State Convention. The best overall ("Best in Show") poem will be featured in the spring Torch.
- 7. The entries must be written to meet the following criteria.
 - 500-1200 words myths with fewer than 500 words or more than 1200 words will have points deducted on the basis of 1 point per 100 words (maximum of 15 penalty points)
 - 2. must be typed and double spaced
 - 3. may be in either prose or poetry form
 - 4. title and student's NCJCL ID number must appear on the top of each numbered page
- 8. Categories of myths
 - an original myth to explain the existence of some phenomenon in nature or modern culture. It should use classical Greek or Roman mythological characters but not a combination of both; new, invented characters with classical names may also be used.
 - a classical myth in modern dress or setting which should be recognizable through the plot and not from the names of the characters (the writer must identify the original myth in a postscript to the story)
 - a new myth using classical figures with the creation of minor new characters allowed, e.g., a new Hercules story.
 - 4. N.B. In all categories, the writer should be careful not to contradict existing myths. New characters and/or new adventures may be invented, but no tampering with basic, traditional mythology may occur.
- 9. Three copies of each entry must be submitted.
- 10. One copy must have a cover sheet attached with a paperclip with the following information:

MODERN MYTH CONTEST RULES

All entries must be saved as a Word document and emailed before Friday, Feburary 21 to Magister Fellers at <u>tfellers@covenantday.org</u>.

Overview of Contest

This is a pre-convention contest. All entries will be submitted and judged before the National Convention. The winning entries will be announced at the convention. The JCL member submitting the entry must attend the convention in order for his or her entry to win an award. There will be three divisions: **lower (grades 6-8)**, **middle (grades 9-10)**, and **upper (grades 11-12)**. Students must compete in the grade level last completed.

A contestant can write one of the following:

- → An original myth to explain the existence of some phenomenon in nature or modern culture (myth should use classical Greek OR Roman mythological characters but not a combination of both; new, invented characters with classical names may also be used);
- → A classical myth in modern dress or setting which should be recognizable through the plot and not from the names of characters (the writer must identify the original myth in a postscript to the story);
- → A new myth using classical figures with the creation of minor new characters (e.g., a new Hercules story).

In all categories, the writer should be careful not to contradict existing myths. New characters and/or new adventures may be invented, but no tampering with basic, traditional mythology should occur.

Submission

A student may enter only ONE myth. If two or more myths are submitted, all will be disqualified. If a myth has been submitted in a previous year, it will be disqualified.

The myth must be 500–1200 words. Myths which have less than 500 words or more than 1200 words will have points deducted on the basis of three points per 100 words. The entry may be in prose or poetry form.

The entry MUST be submitted via email as a Microsoft Word file to the address listed above by the deadline. The title, grade level, and category must appear at the top of each page. Pages must be numbered. Three points will be deducted for violating any of these guidelines. The contestant's name may NOT appear on the entry. The entry will be disqualified if the name appears.

Cover Sheet

In addition to the file containing the myth entry, a second file must also be emailed as part of the submission to serve as a cover sheet. This cover sheet file must include the following information:

- * Name of the delegate
- ★ School
- ★ State
- ★ Teacher's name
- ★ Grade last completed
- ★ Category

- ★ Total number of words
- ★ Title of the myth

If the cover sheet file is missing the grade level, the entry will be disqualified. If any of the other cover-sheet information is missing, three points will be deducted for each missing item.
